Class Activity - Match the types



	Messaging	Often in the form of an attention grabbing but misleading headline, we are encouraged us to click on the web link (e.g. "you won't believe what this famous person is doing now!")
	Notifications	Apps and icons often use bright, attention grabbing colours to make them stand out from other things on our screen.
	Clickbait	When we are looking for the latest updates in things like chats or news, apps will often get us to check for fresh items by swiping down from the top of the screen.
	Infinite Content	When communicating with someone else, the app tells us that something is happening to keep our attention on the screen (e.g. Sam is typing...)
	Colour	When watching videos, the next video automatically begins to play after the last one has finished, keeping our attention focussed on the screen.

	Autoplay	To encourage us to use an app on a regular basis, we can build up rewards by messaging friends every day but if we miss a day, we lose everything we have built up and have to start again.
	Refresh	Often using the information that apps collect about us, apps will suggest we make new connections with other people we may (or may not) know.
	Friend Suggestions	When we look through something, the app continues to add more and more items to keep us scrolling so we never actually get to the end.
	Streaks	Designed to draw our attention, apps often use bright colours and numbers next to icons to notify us that there are things to look at.
