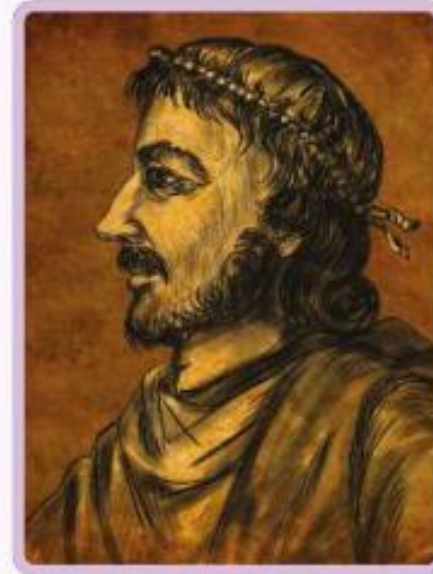


Who controlled England in the 10th century?

Concerned about threats to his life, Ethelred ordered all the Danes living in England to be killed. This day is known as the St Brice's Day **Massacre**. Historians know little about that day but there were attacks on Danes and some were killed. However, the consequences were huge! Ethelred became known as the 'unready' meaning he was unwise. As **revenge** for the attacks, Danish King Sweyn Forkbeard led several invasions of England. Finally, Ethelred escaped to Normandy leaving most of England in Danish control with Sweyn as king.

Sweyn Forkbeard died in 1014 which gave Ethelred the opportunity to reclaim his throne. After two years of fighting, Sweyn's son, King Cnut, came to power. During the same year, Ethelred died and Cnut married his widow, Emma of Normandy.

Ethelred's son, Edmund Ironside, made peace with Cnut by agreeing to divide England between them. However, Edmund died shortly after they made the **truce** and Cnut became king of England as well as later becoming king of both Denmark and Norway.

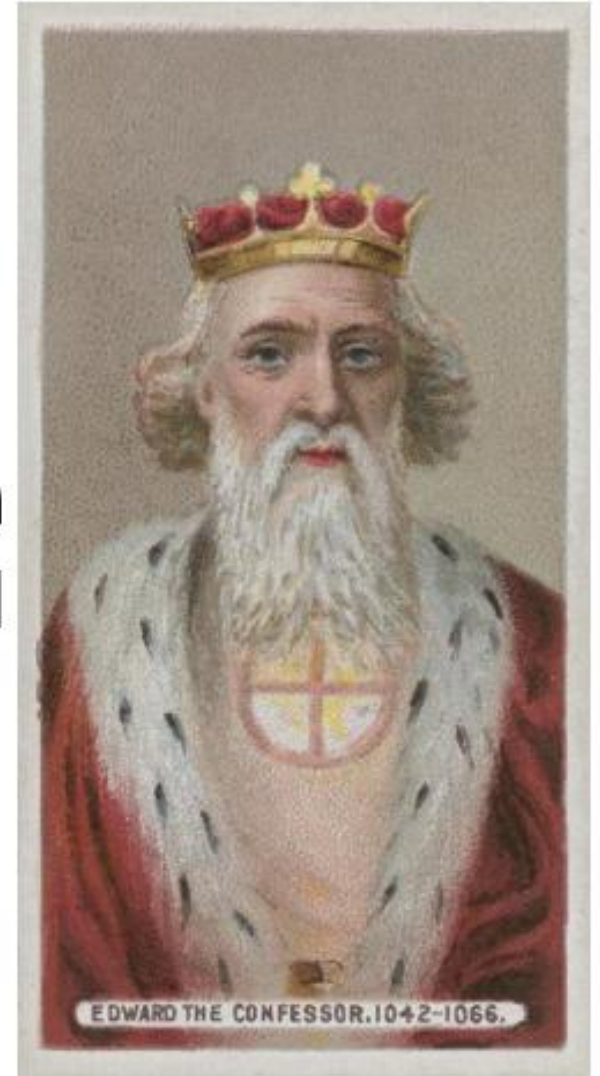

Was that the end of the Vikings in England?

After 25 years of Danish rule, Ethelred and Emma's son, Edward the Confessor was crowned in 1042 and died without an heir in 1066.

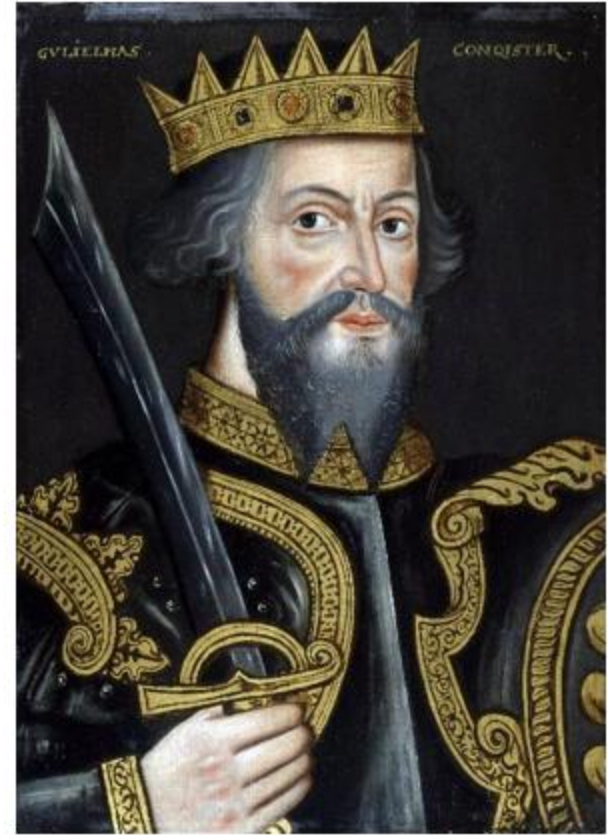
That same year saw the last Viking invasion of England which was led by King Harald III of Norway. It was unsuccessful. However, in the same year, an invasion from France was a success.

Was that the end of the Vikings in England?

This invasion was led by William, Duke of Normandy who became King William I of England. He was a descendant of the Viking Rollo, who invaded and took over part of northern France in 911 CE. So, in some ways the Vikings did take over England after all!

Was that the end of the Vikings in England?

As other migrants had before them, the Viking settlers and rulers had a lasting impact on England. These influences included the Viking trade network, boat design and navigation, clothing, food, and craft. Perhaps the most profound impact however was on the language. Many common English words today, such as 'muck', 'husband', and 'knife' all came originally from Norse.
