



f Think of them as "glue words" that stick equal things together.

Coordinating conjunctions are small words that **join two equal parts of a sentence** (like two words, phrases, or sentences).

The most common ones are remembered by the acronym **FANBOYS**:

- For → reason (because)
- And → addition
- Nor → negative addition
- **B**ut → contrast
- Or → choice
- Yet → contrast (like "but")
- So → result

Examples:

- I like tea and coffee.
- She was tired, but she kept working.
- Do you want pizza or pasta?
- He didn't call, nor did he text.

- Draw a line under the numbers using a ruler.

Step 3: Add the tens column.

Step 4: Add the hundreds column.







Writing a diary entry

When you write a diary entry you are writing about a day in the life of a real person or character.

The diary entry needs to sound as if the person or character has written it so it needs to be written from their point of view.

It also needs to be exciting and interesting to read. Let's look at the main features.

TBAT: recognise the features of a diary extract

Features of a diary - First person

When you write a diary entry, you are writing as yourself or as the person the diary belongs to. That means you use first person, which is when you say "I," "me," "my," and "we."

For example:



"I went to the park and had so much fun!"

Think of a diary like you're talking to a special friend (your diary) about your day. You write about:

- What you did
- How you felt
- What you thought

Features of a diary - date and time

When you write a diary entry, the date and time of the entry is usually written at the top, like this:

17th May 1349

Dear Diary,

You would not believe what has happened in our village over the last few days! Somewhat horrifyingly, the deadly plague has arrived on our doorstep and is coming for us. Pestilence swept rapidly through our village since its arrival and I am starting to see horrendously gruesome and unspeakable things happening everywhere nearby.

Features of a diary - past tense

Diaries are usually written about an event that has already occurred so should be written in the past tense.

Features of a diary - personal emotions and feelings

A diary is usually a secret place to write the truth about how you feel about what has happened to you in the day.

In a diary you might include feelings, hopes or fears that you wouldn't want anyone to know about.

Look at the examples below.

Dear Diary,

Today, I am **so tired** after marching for hours under the hot sun. My armour feels heavy, and **my feet ache**, but **I am proud** to be part of the Roman army. **I feel nervous** about tomorrow's battle, yet I know **I must be brave** for Rome.

Features of a diary - time conjunctions

A diary is usually describing lots of events. To make sense of when these events happened, it is helpful to include **time conjunctions and adverbials**. If we just use one word such as 'then' to link the events in our diary it can get very boring!

Look at the example below. Can you identify the time conjunctions and adverbials that have been used?

What is a guru?

In many traditions, a **guru** is someone who helps them learn and grow.

A **guru** isn't just a teacher in a classroom. A **guru** is someone who shows them the right path, helps them understand important lessons and leads them to be their best selves.

The word 'guru' comes from the ancient language of Sanskrit, where it means 'one who removes darkness'.

Sikhs believe that there were **10 gurus** who came to the world to give God's teachings to human beings.

Guru Nanak was the first guru and founder of the Sikhi religion, and his teachings are still followed by many Sikhs around the world.

Guru Nanak wanted everyone to be treated equally, and he showed people that love and kindness are the most important things in the world.





He travelled to spread the message of truth, peace and the oneness of God.




1st journey







Digital Footprint



Your digital footprint includes all your online activity, such as:


- the websites or web pages you visit


