Izzy explains why we use stories in Religious education.



Listening to important stories helps us to understand people's worldviews better.

We can learn about how different people **interpret** the deeper meaning of these stories and also see what difference the stories make to people today.

In this lesson we will be using a story about Joseph to help us understand Christian worldviews.





FAMOUS LANDMARKS

The Egyptian Pyramids

These are in Egypt and were built over 4000 years ago. The most famous of these pyramids are found in Giza, near Cairo. They were built as tombs for the pharaohs.



Victoria Falls

These amazing waterfalls are found between two countries - Zambia and Zimbabwe. Although they are not the highest or widest waterfalls in the world, they are considered some of the most impressive.



Mount Kilimanjaro

This mountain is in Tanzania. It is the highest mountain in Africa and stands at 5895 metres above sea level. You can see amazing glaciers all around. Many people have enjoyed climbing it.

Climate and landscapes in Africa

Africa is so big, therefore it has lots of different climates and landscapes—from hot sandy **deserts**, wet **rainforests**, and warm **savannahs** to snowy mountain tops and long rivers.

Africa has the world's largest hot desert—the Sahara Desert. It can reach temperatures of 57 degrees Celsius during the day! Animals like the fennec fox, dromedary camel, and horned viper snake live in the Sahara.






Climate and landscapes in Africa

Africa also has the world's longest river—the River Nile. It flows for 4,132 miles through 11 countries, including Egypt and Ethiopia. Can you find this river on a map or atlas?








Rainforests in Africa

Most of Africa's rainforests are found in the Congo river basin, on the Atlantic Ocean side (the east) of the continent.







Savannahs in Africa

Africa is famous for its amazing wildlife. Its **animal reserves** and savannahs are home to wildlife such as lions, zebras, gazelles, cheetahs, and elephants.




The Serengeti National Park is the most famous savannah in Tanzania. Here, animals like wildebeest move around large areas in search for food. This movement is called **migration**.



Savannahs in Africa

Mount Kilimanjaro is a dormant volcano in Tanzania. 'Dormant' means that the volcano is 'asleep'— the volcano has not erupted for a long time and is unlikely to erupt soon.

Mount Kilimanjaro is the highest mountain in Africa. It is part of Kilimanjaro National Park, and lots of people visit the park to climb the large mountain.






