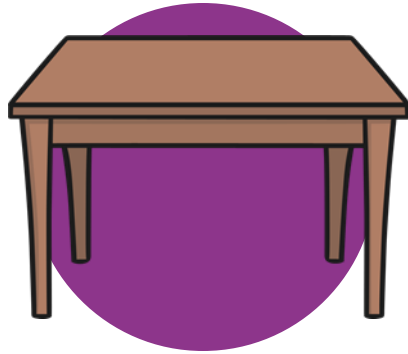
/l/ Spelt 'le'

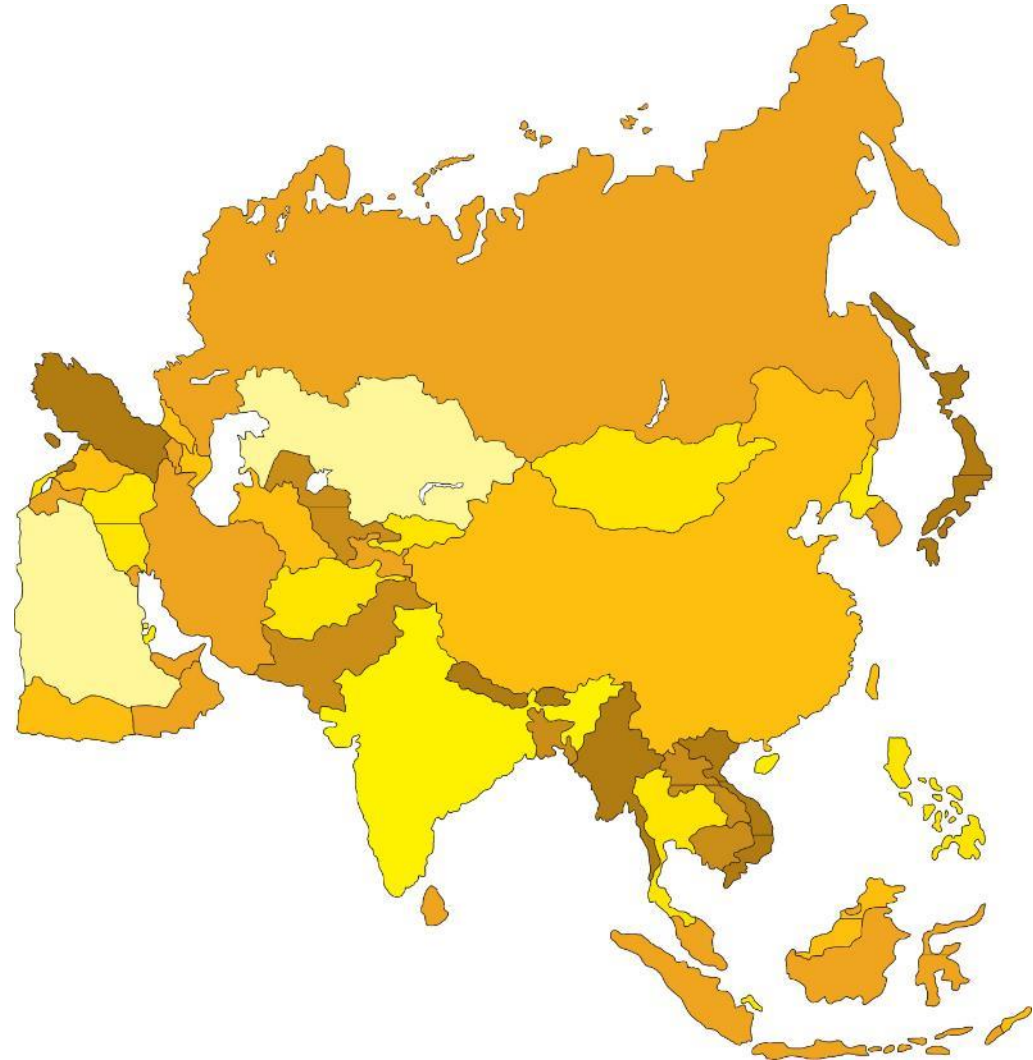
- Asia is the biggest continent in the world and is made up of 48 countries.

Asia is the biggest continent in the world. Just over half of the world's population live in Asia.

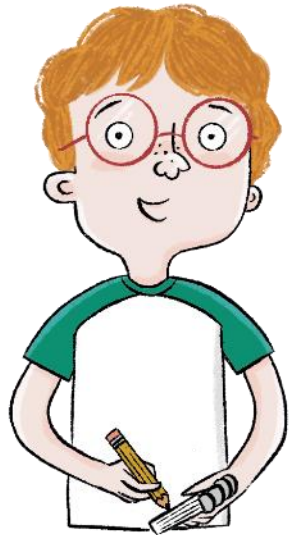
Asia is separated from Europe by a land **border**.

The Burj Khalifa is the tallest **skyscraper** in the world. It is more than 800 metres tall!

The Shinkansen is one of the fastest trains in the world, with speeds of up to 185 miles per hour! It is also called the 'bullet' train because it goes so fast.

Mount Everest (Nepal)



Mount Everest is the largest and highest mountain on Earth. It is 8,850 metres tall. It is in the Himalayas, which is a mountain range that spans across Asia, Nepal, and China.

Taj Mahal (India)



The Taj Mahal is a mosque-like building. It was built in the seventeenth century as a tomb for an emperor's wife. It is considered one of the most beautiful buildings in the world.

The Gobi Desert is a vast desert that covers parts of Mongolia and China. The word 'Gobi' means 'waterless place' in the Mongolian language.

Landmarks in Asia

The Dead Sea (Jordan, Palestine, and Israel)



The Dead Sea is a very salty lake, and is the lowest place on Earth! The salt means there are not many plants and animals living there—this is why it is called ‘dead’.

Great Wall of China (China)



The Great Wall of China is an ancient wall built in northern China. It is the longest wall that humans have ever built. Today, the wall is more than 21,000 km long!



Animals in Asia

Asia is so large that it has many different climates. With deserts, grassland, forests, and mountains, there are a variety of **habitats** and animals that live there. Some of the most famous are giant pandas, orangutans, tigers, and snow leopards.



Animals in Asia

The giant panda used to be one of the world's rarest mammals, but now its numbers are rising. It lives in the misty mountain forests in China and eats bamboo.



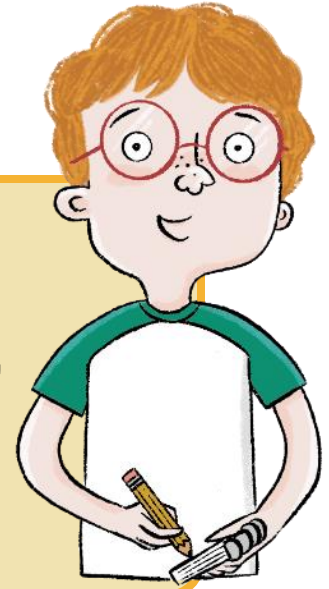
Animals in Asia

Asian tigers are big cats that live in the forests of south and east Asia. The tiger stripes serve as **camouflage** and they are good swimmers. The Bengal tiger is the world's most common tiger and lives in Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, and Nepal.



Animals in Asia

Snow leopards live in Asia's high mountains, including the Himalayas. The Himalayas run through Bhutan, China, India, and Nepal. They are known as the 'ghosts of the mountains' because it is very hard to spot one—their fur is good camouflage in the snowy mountains.
