Tuesday 5th November TBAT: recognise direct speech.

Direct speech is shown by writing exactly what was spoken between inverted commas. For example: "Hello!" said Shilo.

Inverted commas (") are punctuation marks which show where speech begins and ends. They are also known as speech marks.

A reporting clause is the part of a sentence which states who is speaking or thinking. For example: David wondered; Shabir asked; Tommy whispered.

In this lesson, we will be learning about recognising direct speech.

Direct speech is used to show that someone is speaking.

"Where is the report?" Sandra asked her secretary.

"I'm not sure. I left it on your desk yesterday evening," Jordan replied timidly.

The direct speech has been highlighted to show what Sandra and Jordan have said to each other.

We use inverted commas (" ") to show when direct speech has been used.

One set of inverted commas is used to show that the speech has started.

"How are you...

And another set is used to show that the speech has finished.

"How are you today?"

We must always remember to use two sets of inverted commas to show when speech has started and finished.

The Direct Speech Song (Inverted Commas)

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We can see these sentences use direct speech because of the inverted commas.

As we can see from the previous examples, sentences that use direct speech are usually made up of two parts.

One part is made up of speech and inverted commas.

The other part is known as the reporting clause.

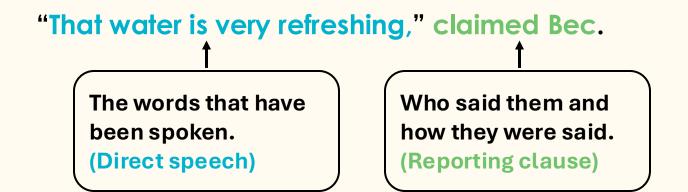
"Leave me alone!" Daisy screeched.

"How will we get to the top of the mountain?" queried Ali worriedly.

Simran laughed loudly, "That was a great joke!"

We do not include the reporting clause in the inverted commas because it has not been spoken aloud.

This means it is not part of the direct speech.



The reporting clause is still important, however, as it gives more information to the reader about who has spoken and how they have said.

Sometimes, the reporting clause can be placed before the direct speech.

"How will we get to the top of the mountain?" queried Ali worriedly.

Simran laughed loudly, "That was a great joke!"

This has no effect on the meaning of the sentence but we must ensure that we check the position of the reporting clause before we use inverted commas.

When reporting how the direct speech has been spoken, we usually use the word 'said'. To ensure we use a wide range of vocabulary, we can use the words shown in the word bank below.

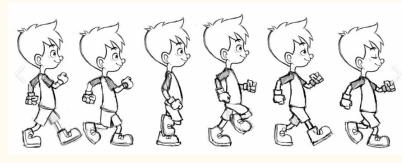

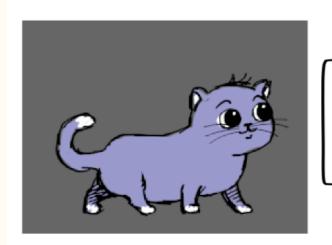

What is **animation**?

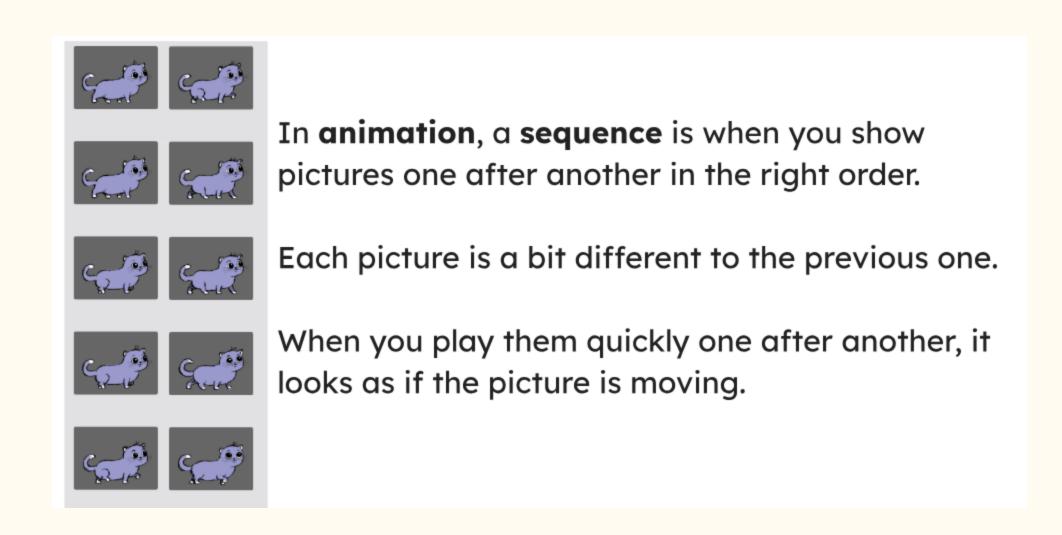


Animation is where a number of pictures are drawn or taken of an object or picture, and the pictures are shown quickly one after another in **sequence**.

This makes it look as if the object or picture is moving.

Animations have been created throughout history.

They were being made even before computers were invented!

Animation is used to create films, games, TV shows and all sorts of projects.

Some of the characters that you know from your favourite shows might be **animated**.



This means that they are created using lots of drawings or pictures, and the pictures are shown quickly in **sequence** to make it look as if they are moving.

There are many ways to make **animations**:

- you can draw using a pencil and paper
- you can use modelling clay, building bricks or other materials and then photograph them
- you can use computers to make pictures



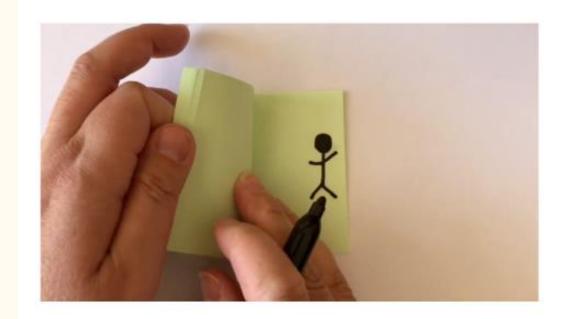

A **flipbook** is a small book where each page has a slightly different picture.

- Start on the bottom sheet.
- Draw your simple stick person on the open edge of the sticky note.

You start on the bottom sheet so that when you turn the page, you can see where the previous drawing is.

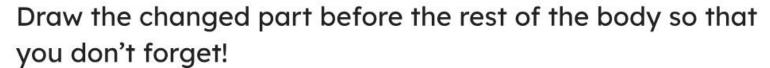
