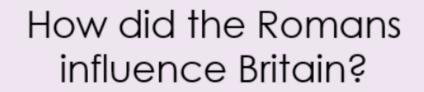
Roman towns

The Romans built towns across Britain to help them control the land and organize their new settlements. Each Roman town followed the same plan, with straight roads and strong foundations for buildings. In the center, there were important places like temples, markets, and bathhouses. Bathhouses were a big part of Roman life because people went there to wash, relax, and meet friends. Roman towns also had aqueducts to bring clean water and sewers to carry away waste. These systems helped keep the towns clean and healthy, making them some of the most advanced settlements in ancient Britain.


Why did Romans build towns and what were Roman towns like?


A settlement is a place where a community of humans live.

Why did Romans build towns?

The Romans built towns across their empire, which were very different from the small roundhouse villages most Britons lived in.

These towns were centres of government and trade, where council members met and people exchanged goods.

Why were towns important places for Romans? What did people do there?



Roman towns were full of fine buildings and temples, and often had running water and sewers.


Aqueducts were built to bring water into the towns.

The streets of a Roman town were laid out in a grid shape, in neat and straight lines. This divided the town into different blocks, known as insulae.

- The forum was the busy market square in the centre of the town.
- The basilica (Roman town hall) was where important decisions were discussed and made.
- The amphitheatre was a large stadium where people gathered to watch games.



The amphitheatre was a large stadium used for watching games



Homes would be in the insulae on the edges of the towns.

Romans often lived upstairs and used the downstairs as a workshop or somewhere to trade from.

Richer Romans lived in much larger houses known as a domus. Even larger homes were known as villas and would be located outside of the towns—in the countryside where the farmers also lived.

What was a Roman bathhouse?

Within a town, the Romans also built public bathhouses. The Romans valued cleanliness and hygiene, but also used bathhouses as a place to meet.

They were beautiful places with mirrors covering the walls, pools made of marble and mosaic floors.






What was a Roman bathhouse?

A bathhouse was either built near to a natural spring, or an aqueduct would bring clean water into it, to be heated.

A range of different rooms were each kept at a different temperature.




