We can better understand people's worldviews by listening to them and asking questions about how they live.

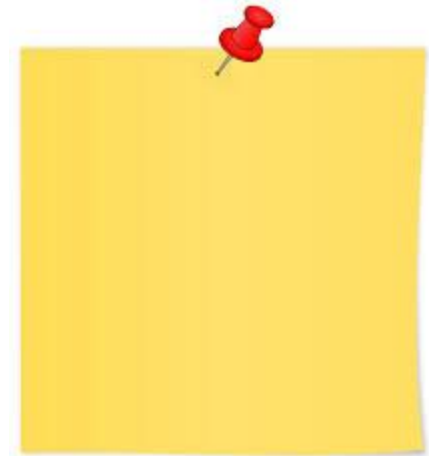
In this lesson we will be learning about the Jewish celebration of **Sukkot** to help us understand Jewish worldviews.

What happens at Sukkot?



During the festival of **Sukkot**, some Jews make shelters in their garden.

The shelter is called a **sukkah**. It is a bit like putting up a tent or building a den.

The Jewish festival of **Sukkot** takes place in the autumn.



The four species of **Sukkot**

During the festival of **Sukkot**, some Jews make a bundle of branches and say a prayer of blessing in the **sukkah**.

The blessing shows gratitude to God for the earth and all the good things in it.

Rafi explains what happens during the festival of **Sukkot**.

During **Sukkot**, we say a special prayer of blessing each day while we wave branches of palm, willow and myrtle.

I stand in the **sukkah** and wave the branches to the North, South, East and West as well as up and down while I ask God to bless us as a family.

Rebecca explains why **Sukkot** is important to her.

Sukkot is time to celebrate and give thanks for all the good things in nature.

When we decorate our **sukkah** with fruit and flowers, we remember how beautiful the natural world is. It reminds me that I should be grateful for everything we have.

At **Sukkot**, Jews remember the story of Moses.

Moses led the Jewish people out of slavery in Egypt.

This escape from Egypt is called the **Exodus**. Jews remember the **Exodus** in their stories, songs and festivals.

Rebecca explains more about **Sukkot**.



Rebecca

It is fun to eat meals in our **sukkah** for seven days during **Sukkot**, but I would not choose to do it all year, especially in the rain!

At **Sukkot**, we remember how Moses and the people camped in the desert after the **Exodus**. They relied on God for protection because the desert was a difficult place to live in. They did not have a choice.

Mahsa is a Sephardi Jew. She attends a Sephardi synagogue.

The festival of **Sukkot** makes me think of people who have had to leave their home, like my father when he arrived in the UK from Iran.

The **sukkah** helps me to imagine what it might be like to be on the move without a place to stay.

When Moses and the Jewish people lived in the desert they could only carry what they needed with them.

Sukkot makes me ask questions about what I really need in life.

Rafi explains more about caring for the world.

Sukkot reminds me that we should look after the natural world. We should not be careless or wasteful. We should use what we have and share it with others.

Moses and the Jewish people would have shared food with each other, just as we share food with family and friends in the **sukkah**.
